DUO TERLANO TO PERFORM

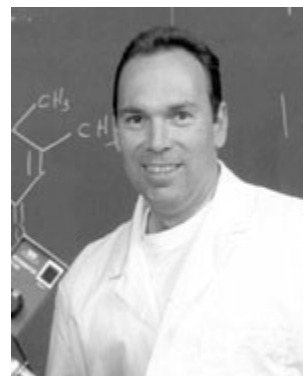
Lebanon Valley College music faculty members Dr. Johannes Dietrich, violin, and his wife, Dr. Marie-Aline Cadieux, cello, will present a concert as Duo Terlano on Sunday, Feb. 8 at 3 p.m. in Zimmerman Recital Hall of the Suzanne H. Arnold Gallery at Lebanon Valley College. They will perform Ludwig van Beethoven's String Quartet Op. 59 # 3 with guest artists Simon Maurer on violin and Agnès Maurer on viola, both highly acclaimed chamber musicians with international reputations. LVC TUITION INCREASE BELOW NATIONAL AVERAGE

The Board of Trustees of Lebanon Valley College announced a tuition increase for the 2004–2005 academic year. The Trustees defied the recent national trend set by four-year public institutions, which in many cases increased tuition by double digits. The Trustees successfully maintained LVC's high academic standards with an eye toward economy. Combined with traditional residence and full board fees, the total increase at LVC amounts to just 4.6 percent. In addition, Dr. G. David Pollick, LVC President, said that "for the third consecutive year, the College will set aside additional funds for currently enrolled students, based on their financial needs, to offset the increase." 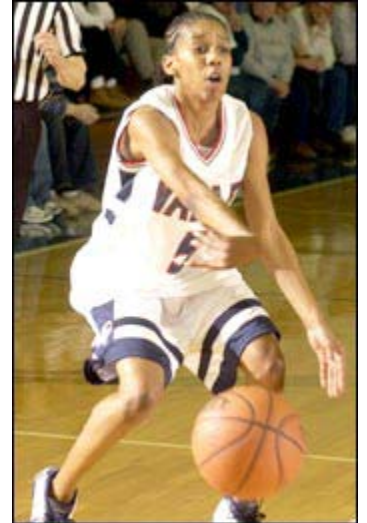

The last trivia question was ... Christmas Eve 2003 marks the 99th anniversary of what disastrous campus event?

Answer ... On Christmas Eve, 1904, a fire of unknown origin destroyed the original LVC Administration Building (1867). It contained the President's offices, classrooms, the science department, dormitory space

for 120 men and the central heat plant. No lives were lost, but the personal effects of the students and the books and official papers of President Roop were reduced to ashes. Total losses were estimated at \$85,000. 2003 marks the 99th anniversary of the disaster.
