CARNEGIE FOUNDATION RECLASSIFIES LVC

The Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching has changed the College's status from a Baccalaureate Colleges - Liberal Arts classification to a Master's Colleges and Universities II classification. This reclassification is based on the number of advanced degrees (Masters of Business Administration, Masters of Science Education and Masters of Physical Therapy) that the College grants each year.

In the 2001 U.S. News and World Report's "America's Best Colleges" issue, LVC is ranked number nine under the category of Best Regional Schools - Liberal Arts Colleges in the North. Because of the change in the College's Carnegie Foundation classification, next year LVC will be ranked in the category of Best Regional Universities - North, with schools like Villanova, Ithaca College (N.Y.), Hood College (Md.) and Mt. Saint Mary's College (Md.).

"HOT DOG" FRANK AWARD GOES TO LOU SORRENTINO

During a half-time ceremony on Saturday, Feb. 10, Lou Sorrentino was honored with the "Hot Dog" Frank Athletic Service Award for his 30 years of dedication to LVC athletics. Sorrentino is the 13th person to be honored since the award was first established in 1985 in honor of Frank Aftosmes (1902-1994).

SURVEY BY PSYCHOLOGY PROFESSOR PROVES IT PAYS TO SHOP AROUND

Dr. Salvatore Cullari, chair of psychology, and the Pennsylvania Psychological Association conducted a survey which shows that Pennsylvanians can save in excess of 60 percent on prescription medicines simply by comparing prices between pharmacies.

"Even without action from Congress, Pennsylvanians can do something right now to lower their prescription drug costs," said Cullari. "I support a comprehensive prescription drug benefit for Medicare, but I also want consumers to know they are empowered to start saving money without waiting for Washington."

SUZANNE H. ARNOLD ART GALLERY TO FEATURE THE WORK OF MARY CASSATT

The Suzanne H. Arnold Art Gallery will present Mary Cassatt, Printmaker, an exhibition featuring 22 color and black-and-white etchings by the famed impressionist artist, from Thursday, March 8 through Saturday, April 14. An opening reception will be held on Friday, March 16 from 5-8 p.m.

Although primarily known for her exquisite oil paintings depicting the tender, psychological charge between mother and child, Mary Cassatt (1844-1926) was also one of the foremost American printmakers, making significant contributions to the etching revival in late nineteenth century America and Europe. Although Cassatt has been the subject of numerous exhibitions, monographs, and thematic studies, her graphic works have only rarely been exhibited together; and the prints --and paintings for that matter -- have never been exhibited in south-central Pennsylvania. This is ironic, given that Cassatt was born in Allegheny City (near Pittsburgh), and lived in Lancaster, Altoona, Chester County, and Philadelphia before moving permanently to Paris in 1871.
