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LVC ANNOUNCES ITS LARGEST GIFT IN HISTORY

Lebanon Valley College has recently announced the largest gift in the history of the College as Dr. Edward H. Arnold, chairman and CEO of Arnold Industries, Inc., and Jeanne Donlevy Arnold, former senior vice president of Patient Care Services at Good Samaritan Hospital, have pledged to contribute \$5,000,000 to the College to assist with a number of planned capital building projects.

"This is a wonderful reaffirmation of all that we are doing, and all that we are planning to accomplish," stated President G. David Pollick. "The Arnolds have voiced their support of an ambitious plan to renovate the Garber Science Center, to convert a gymnasium in Lynch Memorial Hall into new classroom and academic uses, and to construct a new gymnasium directly adjacent to the Heilman Center. The generosity of the gift will allow us to provide services to our students that exceed those traditionally found at small, private, liberal arts colleges."

The \$5,000,000 contribution will be developed as a challenge gift with the goal of raising an additional \$10,000,000 toward capital projects on the Annville campus.

LVC FACILITIES WIN AWARDS

The College recently received the following three awards recognizing its outstanding academic and athletic facilities:

* The Heilman Center received an Honor Award from the 2000 Central Pennsylvania Chapter of the American Institute of Architects (AIA) Excellence in Design Program. This is the second year in a row that the Heilman Center has been recognized by the AIA. Last year, the facility

earned a Merit Award.

* McGill Baseball Park was named the 2000 College Baseball Field of the Year by the Sports Turf Managers Association. The award is the highest honor given by the STMA, and incorporates all National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) divisions.

* For the second straight season, the National Fastpitch Coaches Association named the LVC softball field as its Regional Field of the Year.

He signed a training camp contract with the World Champion Los Angeles Lakers in August, but was cut before the season began.
