Lebanon Valley College will continue "The 1960s," a year long colloquium featuring a film series, lectures, panel discussion and musical performances. Events are free (except for the film series) and all are open to the public. Highlights of the spring portion of the colloquium include the performance

"Reflections: Martin Luther King, Jr." and the lecture "Why the Sixties Are Still Controversial." Also featured will be "The 60s Bowl" on Wednesday, January 23 at 7 p.m. in the Leedy Theatre of the Mund College Center. Hosted by LVC professors, this is an audience participation game show in which audience members will win prizes by correctly answering multiple choice questions about the 1960s. ATHLETIC NEWS

The men's ice hockey team is currently ranked 12th in Division III with an 11-2 record. The team has won 11 straight games and is a perfect 6-0 in the ECAC Northeast League. Recently the team trounced 13th-ranked Elmira College, 6-3.

Freshman Jon-David Byers of Westminster, Md., led LVC's men's basketball team to a stunning 62-56 overtime win over seventh-ranked Franklin & Marshall College. The rookie point-guard scored a team-high 17 points that included 12 points in overtime. Junior Darren Pugh of the men's basketball team is having a tremendous season. The center from Shippensburg is ranked fourth in the Commonwealth in scoring (18.1) and first in rebounding (13.5). Pugh recently was selected as the Commonwealth and ECAC Southern Player of the Week for third time this season.

Junior Stephanie Tighe of the women's basketball team is on track to become the school's all-time leading scorer. The forward reached the 1,000 career-point plateau last weekend, surpassing Carla Myers '91, who finished her career with 1,000 points. Tighe needs 39 points to climb to second-place. She is currently leading the conference in scoring with 19.1 points per game.

The men's and women's swimming teams picked up wins at King's College last weekend. The men's and women's indoor track teams open their season this weekend as Lebanon Valley hosts the LVC Invitational. For more information, log on to www.lvc.edu/athletics.

The winners of December's trivia question (Which building is the oldest on campus?) are Ken Miller '89, Arran Adams '90, Lawrence Silverstein '78 and Cyndi Boehler-Walsh '76. Constructed in the mid-1800s, Laughlin Hall (located on Main St. next to the United Methodist Church) is the oldest building on the Lebanon Valley College campus. Originally the Brightbill residence, the building was known as the Sprague residence when it was acquired by the College in 1949. It served briefly as the residence of President Clyde A. Lynch, and was later a faculty lounge, faculty residence and a dormitory. The hall honors Professor Maud Laughlin, who chaired the history department during the years 1946-1957. The building was totally renovated and expanded in 1990 and houses the Advancement Offices-alumni programs, college relations and development.
